This presentation has been organized by Dr. Ann Biersteker, Assistant Director of the African Studies Center at Michigan State University, East Lansing, Michigan and daughter of Joe Bierstecker, TEEA6 (Joe was at Kenyatta). Ann's specialty is Swahili Literature and especially the challenges and rewards of translating Swahili poetry. Ann has recruited two other professors to join her. Pre-Reunion Optional Addition for Day One, Thursday August 17, 2017

Noon to 4 – **Tour of Islamic Center of America in Dearborn, Michigan**, 7 miles from Detroit. This tour has been strongly recommended by committee member Ron Stockton (TEA 4C, Machakos), who is now a professor of political science at the University of Michigan, Dearborn. The tour is free and includes lunch.

The Islamic Center of America is the largest mosque in the United States. The Muslim presence in the Detroit area goes back well into the 19th century. The mosque was started in the 1950s by a small group of Arab-Americans, mostly Lebanese Shia. It was in a much smaller facility then. It has grown enormously. It is situated in Dearborn whose population is of approximately 40% Arab (mostly Muslim) heritage. The ICA is known for its welcoming approach to visitors unfamiliar with its history and tradition.

You will have to provide your own transportation to the ICA but if you are arriving on Thursday, you could come directly from the airport.
